MISSIONAL VITAL SIGNS – Each week we ask you to fill out a connect card in church. Not only does it help as with our attendance records, but it helps us with an overview of how the church is functioning. Below is some information that will help explain why we ask for the information we do, including the Salty Service numbers we ask for each week. We hope you will take the time to read these explanations and if you have any questions feel free to ask us about any of them.

Explanation of Missional Vital Signs

This is a brief overview of the Missional Vital Signs (MVS) for the local church. This information is gathered weekly and reported monthly through electronic means by the local church to the Office of Congregational Vitality.

Every church has a designated person who is the MVS reporter. It is important to remember that numbers are only indicators of the behaviors that produce them. This tool is to discern what works, what does not, what we can do differently, and how can we bring more disciples to Christ.

Passionate Worship/AWA

This number includes any service held weekly as a primary opportunity for worship, including alternative worship services in addition to regular Sunday morning services. Examples of alternative services are a separate youth worship service as part of youth ministry, a Celebrate Recovery service, and a service held on a week night or Saturday, including a Fresh Expressions type of worship that meets the above criteria. Children who participate in a children's service may be counted, but not infants. If a group is away together on a mission trip or retreat, those people may also be counted. Occasional and special services, such as Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, Christmas Eve and funerals, are not included in these counts.

Radical Hospitality/POF & RAF

Radical hospitality: the total number of persons received into membership measured by "profession of faith" (POF) and "reaffirmation of faith" (RAF).

POF: The first public expression of commitment to Christian faith by an individual in which she or he acknowledges commitment to Jesus Christ and pledges to learn to live as one of His disciples. This number includes youth who join the church through the confirmation process. It also includes adults who have never been a member of a congregation who come to faith and choose to live out that faith as part of your congregation.

RAF: Reaffirmation of faith indicates "a person who has been baptized at some point in his or her life, has made a profession of faith, and has possibly been a member of a congregation but has not actively been involved for quite some time. These people are renewing their faith as part of your congregation. They are not a transfer from another congregation.

Explanation of Missional Vital Signs - Continued

Intentional Discipling Small Groups

This measure is the number of <u>persons</u> involved in intentional discipling small groups. A discipling small group is defined as any group with two or more individuals who meet at least monthly (to be counted the week of meeting), share a commitment to become more like Jesus, read and reflect on scripture, explore what it means to apply God's word to their lives, share honest feedback, and pray for one another. Examples include discipleship study, most Sunday school classes, alpha groups, youth groups, Emmaus reunion groups, Financial Peace, and Celebrate Recovery small groups. Not counted are Scouts, outside groups like AA, choir (unless intentional about the above criteria), or child care for group meetings.

Salty Service

This indicates the number of <u>persons</u> in weekly worship who claim to have joined Jesus in Salty Service to persons outside their congregation for a least one hour during the prior week. Salty Service may include any of the following elements:

- 1. Hands on mercy ministry alleviating the suffering of others.
- 2. Justice ministry addressing systems that cause suffering.
- 3. Earth care as a steward of God's creation.
- Relationship-building to ease the emotional or spiritual needs of others.

The person is counted, not the numbers of hours people are serving. Example: If a person is serving in a soup kitchen for at least an hour, he or she is counted as one person who has served.

A person's self-selection will not be as verifiable as the other measures. The goal is to focus on and encourage Salty Service, not gain absolutely accurate numbers. While this may seem to be a difficult data piece, it is crucial to keep discussing, learning, and improving our outreach to others.

Extravagant Generosity

This number is the total amount given to God's church for budgeted operating and capital expenses and missional purposes in addition to or part of the budget. This includes all contributions received by pledged and unpledged giving, loose plate offerings, and funds given for capital debt, building or repairs, or special offerings to ministries beyond the church (UMCH, youth mission trip, Africa University, Habitat for Humanity, Storm Recovery or a sister congregation in Cuba or Angola).

Excluded are interest income, memorial bequeaths, facility use fees, income from child care, adult day care ministries, thrift stores, pumpkin patches and similar fundraisers, as these do not reflect the financial generosity of the congregation.



MEALS ON WHEELS

Do you know someone that cannot shop or prepare hot meals for themselves? The **Meals On Wheels** organization has now expanded to our Lake Osborne area! **Meals on Wheels** focuses on caring for individuals whose diminished mobility makes it hard to shop for food and prepare meals. Generally, the program serves adults age 60 and over. The program begins via an application and leads to an assessment of the need for meals.

At the core of the **Meals on Wheels** service is a nutritious meal, companionship and a watchful eye on the health and safety of our seniors. Adequate nutrition is necessary for health, functionality and the ability to remain independent. **Meals on Wheels** ensures that seniors have access to adequate nutrition even when family support, mobility and resources are lacking. For many seniors, the trusted **Meals on Wheels** volunteer who shows up every day with a hot meal and a warm smile is the <u>only</u> person they see or speak with all day. The safety check that accompanies each meal delivery ensures that, in the case of an emergency or problem, medics will be called, families will be notified and our seniors will not be forgotten. Depending on individual circumstances, meals are provided on a sliding fee scale.
